News from the Village Hall

Many of you will have seen the flurry of activity at the Hall over the past few weeks photographers, camera crews, journalists and lots of villagers! You may even have heard the radio or seen articles in the papers and on the television news. What's all this media attention. been about? Well, the Hall has now benefitted from the successful application to the Cut Your Carbon Competition run by EEDA (East of England Development Agency), by the Wenhaston Energy Support Group (WESG). The £70,000 awarded was the result of the hard work and many talents of the WESG (led by Janet Dillaway), EnergyMix (Jonathan Bell) and members of the VHMC. Further details about the competition can be found in Serena Inskip's article. The VHMC would like to thank all those involved.

In addition, the VHMC can announce that it will be receiving a further £48,000 (approx.) from the Community Sustainable Energy Programme (Big Lottery Fund). This money, along with other funds has been secured by the hard effort and expertise of Roland Hammond (VHMC). This brings our current total close to £150,000 - that means we are $\frac{3}{4}$ of the way there! This is tremendous news! All details about the refurbishment can be found on display boards at the Hall.

Please note that as of 1st September 2008, the reviewed scales of charges for the Hall will be implemented. Any prior bookings will remain at previous rates. Affiliated clubs will have their copies in the plastic wallets at the Hall. Copies for private hire will be available on the display board inside the Hall. Hope to see you at the Hall sometime. 
New Service For Wenhaston

The Maple Farm Kelsale organic vegetable box scheme delivers up prime, fresh, organic produce into the Blythweb Ltd offices every Wednesday. Whether you've ordered yourself a family-sized box or smaller scale bag, there's always a pleasant surprise in store: the contents vary from week to week, going with the flow of the seasons like the world always used to. There could be freshly picked organic greens, creamy white new potatoes, plump broad beans, all the seasonal stew-pot staples plus a pot of spritely coriander to grace the windowsill and make that next dish even more flavoursome

You might have met the Maple Farm Kelsale team at one of the local farmers' markets. They share a passion for 'slow', tasty food and special respect for the land and its natural processes and balances. As organic farmers, they believe that if you look after the soil, it will grow healthy plants. They also encourage wildlife by leaving miles of hedgerows uncut, by planting new woods and protecting the ponds and streams.

Growing and selling locally is fundamental to the farm's philosophy: the organic vegetables from the market garden, organic eggs from the free range flocks, the local honey from the woodland hives and home-milled flour from the farm's organic crops are only distributed within a fifteen mile radius of the farm gates.

Play Your Part in Reducing Cycle Crime

Cycle crime is an ongoing problem. The number of cyclists is increasing as people look to improve their health, avoid congestion and reduce emissions. As more of us use cycles, it is vital we ensure they are kept secure at all times.

In the year 2006/2007 there were 1,759 reported cycle thefts across Suffolk.

Tracker bikes fitted with GPS satellite tracking equipment are being used by Suffolk Police across the county to deter and catch cycle thieves, who may be frequent offenders.

Five simple steps to protect your bike:

Lock it – wherever you are, even within a secure shed or garden.

Secure it - with good quality security locks such as the hardened D-shaped lock

Mark it – using a UV pen to write your postcode and highlight this fact with stickers

Record it – registering your bike with <u>www.immobilise.com</u>

Park it – using secure cycle parks or in a busy well-lit area

Seventy thousand pounds! This is how much we applied to East of England Development Agency's Cut Your Carbon fund for, and - as you probably know from BBC Look East or BBC Suffolk or The Beach radio - it's the full amount we were awarded. True to our name - we supported the (very appreciative!) Village Hall Committee's request for help to raise funding for renovations - and tapped into EEDA's £2.5 million offer to community groups to produce innovative ideas for cutting carbon.

Guided by Jonathan Bell of The Energy Mix consultancy, some members of each committee did the number-crunching and form-filling, and we reached the short-list of 9 (out of 24 applicants) invited to make a presentation to the judging panel - a group of eminent scientists and directors of agencies, including Prof. Tim O'Riordan who spoke at our Forum last year.

Janet Dillaway and David Smeaton-Small went to the Cambridge HQ and gave 10 minutes of Powerpoint with slides. They were then asked - in a gentle Dragon's Den kind of way - to flesh out, embellish the story of our village and all its carbon-cutting achievements so far. No wonder we got the award! And it'll go a long way towards funding three specific pieces of work -

- 1. Cavity wall and roof-space insulation, and energy-efficient lighting.
- 2. A bio-mass boiler fuelled with wood-pellets from Rendlesham Forest.
- 3. Photo-voltaic cells to produce all electricity, and sell back any excess to the National Grid. What is more, this award makes us eligible for future pockets of funding from Suffolk County Council's Green Fund for any new projects we want to set up. Reading the East Anglian article (July 14th) I'm inspired by the other winners' projects. Could we too be thinking of eg. solar-powered street lighting, or a 'Watt-Watchers' club? Let's keep up the energy and make things happen!

I still think the Energy Meter now circulating is an ideal first step for getting to know how we use electricity. It helped me to get thinking about what I'm paying for and how much less it could be! Call Janice Claxton 01502 478158.

Smuggling

This was more of a way of life than anything else in the 17th and 18th centuries. A number of Inns were the centre of smuggling tales and of course ghost stories were bandied around to keep nosy people away. There were the Hadleigh gang and the Sizewell gang and the local Inn that had a smuggling pedigree was the Queen's Head at Blyford.

The story is told that when John Key was landlord in the early 1800s, the Inn was used as a hiding place for contraband.

One day they were warned that the custom men were on the way so they rubbed mustard and

turpentine on the arms of their daughter Mary Jane. When the customs arrived they were invited in but told their daughter was very ill. They opened the door and after one look left in a hurry!

Mary Jane it seems later married and lived with her husband in Nowhere House, opposite Brook Farm. It is said that she gave her husband a sword that her father, John, had taken from a dragoon. Naturally they say that ghostly footsteps are heard on the floor of the first floor bedroom. It's a good story anyway.

Last Spring's Course - 'The English Estate Revealed' - was taught by Mike Hardy as part of a sweeping historical review since very earliest times. It was illustrated by reference to a specific estate lying between Bungay and Harleston. It covered agriculture, architecture, gardening and the changing relationship between Monarchy, Church and the Aristocracy. The reasons for the rise and fall of the great Country House were discussed. A most enjoyable follow-up to the course was a visit to Castle Acre in Norfolk. The castle, church and the magnificent ruins of the Cluniac priory were appreciated by all who went.

This Autumn's Course is to be 'Pax Britannica' with Simon Doney. Over ten weeks, beginning on Friday 19th September, in the Church Room, Wenhaston. This will be a brief history of the British Empire from the 18th century to the World Wars and decolonisation.

Note that there will be an Open Morning on 12th September at 10:30am to 12noon in the Church Room when you can meet the tutor and learn further details of the Course and its content. There is no charge for this session.
