Where Do Battery Collections Go?

After batteries have been deposited into one of

our tubs or BatteryCans we make a collection and bulk the batteries up at one of our regional depots. We then send them out to a specialist facility who sort the batteries into

The service is available 24 hours a day seven days a week and aims to respond in person within 45 minutes. If the nature of the call is more serious the emergency services can also be dispatched.

The Suffolk Careline service is designed to compliment other public sector services already in operation such as the Primary Care Trusts and the East of England Ambulance Trust.

'What is a cottage garden?' 'What is a cottage?'

These were the opening questions posed to us by our speaker, Ric Staines. Most of us thought that hollyhocks and roses around the door represented a quintessentially English cottage garden. As to a cottage? Well, a two up, two down, possibly with a thatched roof.

'All well and good,' said Ric. He then went on to tell us that originally a cottage garden was used to sustain the family throughout the year. Fruit trees would be planted with a pig and chickens rooting around underneath. (Chickens are sometimes called tractors as they peck, dig and fertilise!) The trees would be pruned and the branches used as firewood, the potash they made would then be returned to the soil. A quick set hedge would sometimes be planted, this contained; sloe, crab apple, hazel and damson thus producing a productive boundary. Herbs such as rosemary, borage and chard would probably have been the only decorative plants but I'm sure a few roses and hollyhocks must have been squeezed in.

Debbie Wargate, Environmental Sustainability Officer for SCDC, and Dan Wheals, Community Environmental Action Adviser for Groundwork will be running a workshop on community woodland issues in Wenhaston later this year.

Letter Received

Dear Sir or Madam

I felt I had to write to you to tell you of an incident I recently experienced in Wenhaston.

While home visiting my family, we were driving out of the village [towards Blyford] near the village sign and passed a cat laying on the side of the road. Thinking that the poor thing had just been hit we stopped as soon as it was safe to do so, turned the car round and went back to check on it. I got out of the car to see if it was still alive, but sadly it was dead. It must have looked splendid when it was alive because it had thick creamy fur, a full bushy tail and was a good sized animal. What was particularly upsetting was that it was apparent it had been there a little while as it was completely cold, and very wet as it was raining. Not havina lived in Wenhaston now for almost 20 years, I had no way of knowing if the cat belonged to anyone nearby so I began knocking at peoples' doors. I am quite aware that most people were probably out at work as I got no reply from the half a dozen doors I knocked at. Finally I saw a gentleman on a mobile phone walking along and I called out to him, thinking all this time that the cat had been hit earlier in the day and that no-one had yet seen it. I told him about the cat and his reply was "Oh, that old thing. It's been there for ages." I was probably rather rude in my reply as I could not honestly believe no-one had moved a dead cat, which may well have been a most loved family pet, from the side of the road (actually it doesn't matter if it was even an old farm cat. It was still something that should have been treated with just a little bit of respect). My mum drove back to her house, collected a plastic bag with which to pick the poor creature up in and came back to the cat. On moving it she was approached by a couple who said something along the lines of "Oh it's your cat is it, it's been there the best part of a fortnight". My mum said no it wasn't hers but she didn't like to see it there and was taking it home to bury it.

I can not begin to express the total absolute disgust this has made me feel for Wenhaston. Every so often I am asked "Why don't you move back, it's so lovely and quiet here. How can you care to live in a city". Quite easily after this. In 20 years of living in Norwich I have never experienced people walking past a dead animal and just leaving it. I have a cat and I can honestly say, the last place on earth I would now care to live in is Wenhaston if this is how the residents and inhabitants treat an animal. I know that cats are not the gardeners' friend, but to just leave one dead on the side of the road and to regularly walk past makes me sick.

This incident happened Christmas week and it has taken me a little while to be able to compose what I wrote. I hope that everyone who walked past that creature feels thoroughly ashamed of themselves. And if they don't, then I am ashamed for you.

I have always felt rather proud of coming from Wenhaston, it is a lovely village and I know that the Doom makes it very well known indeed. But after this, when I am asked where I come from I shall say "Wenhaston I'm afraid" and when I am asked to explain I shall. I pity anyone who lives in the village with a pet, I sincerely hope it doesn't injure itself and require assistance or pity, apparently there is none to give in Wenhaston.


