

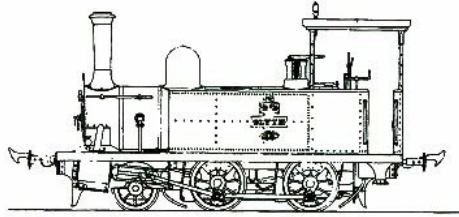

Southwold Railway Heritage Centre, Wenhaston



The Southwold Railway Trust is proposing to create a Southwold Railway Heritage Centre at Wenhaston. This will involve building a replica of the old Wenhaston Station on a new site plus a small complex of agricultural-looking buildings containing engine shed, coach shed and visitor facilities. A replica Southwold Railway locomotive and coach will run over about half a mile of track on mostly original trackbed running eastwards from the station site which is accessed from Blyford Lane.

The project will be on display at Wenhaston Village Hall on Sunday 31st October from 10:00am to 4:00pm with presentations at 12noon and 3:00pm.

Simon Adams

Simon was my youngest brother, born in 1968 on a busy family farm in Falkenham near Felixstowe. As a child he spent hours with dad and other men working on the farm. Simon always loved showing people things on the farm, including delivering lambs. At the age of 11 Simon became a Christian, committing his life to the Lord Jesus Christ-the best decision he ever made. He was baptised the following year.

Simon passed his driving test at 17 and bought a white mini. He used to do crazy things like driving round roundabouts the wrong way. Apparently he once managed to go round 6 times before another car came! Stories like this remind us all of what Simon was like – he was loads of fun and mischievous in a lovely way. He was a really kind person.

After school, Simon went to agricultural college and in the second year he worked on a farm in Australia. When Simon returned from Australia I can remember picking him up from the airport. It was an amazing sight! He had gone out there less than a year before looking relatively normal, with us worried whether he would survive and he returned with facial hair, a large hat with corks, a large and very smelly 'dri-as-a-bone' coat and funny sheep shearing shoes and spoke with an Australian accent! 'No worries' was his favourite phrase! In his last year at college Simon felt God calling him to do Christian work. It was soon after this that he and Fiona met. Simon and Fiona married in September 1992 and then went to All Nations Christian College for two years. In October 1995 they went to Nigeria with a mission organisation to do some rural development work. They spent time learning the local language and exploring ideas but Simon's mental health deteriorated and despite care in Nigeria, they had to return to England in June 1996 with Simon suffering from severe clinical depression.

He returned to live and work on the family farm in Felixstowe, often driving the farm lorry for the farm and other local contractors, delivering sugar beet and other crops. He always worked hard, did long hours, thought things through, and was meticulous. He loved loads of things including rabbit shooting, cycling, his dogs, go-karting, canal boat holidays, wood turning, vegetable gardening and making his brilliant shepherd's hut.

For the next 15 years Simon suffered from depression. He had good times, good weeks and months but the last 15 years have been a roller-coaster of good times and very down times. We saw glimpses of the 'old' Simon but his whole body and mind was racked with depression and he saw himself as a failure despite the evidence around him and whatever people said to him.

God blessed Simon and Fiona with three lovely children, Katie, Carys and Callum. In 2008 Simon decided to move away from the family farm. He got a job at a farm in Bramfield and the family moved to a house in Wenhaston. Following a period of depression last year Simon lost his job on the farm. He then got a job at Woottens Nursery at Wenhaston. Michael Loftus, the owner, describes how Simon walked in and asked for a job; there were no vacancies but Michael was impressed by his complete integrity and openness, and offered him a one day trial, before giving him a permanent job. Simon enjoyed his job and learnt quickly about horticulture. Michael and Lizzy said 'We and all our staff loved Simon, we were hugely privileged to have known him. Despite the ever present burden of depression he was always light hearted and positive, he was courteous and helpful to his work colleagues. It is hard to understand how he suffered when all we saw was his goodness. He was true to himself, inspirational in his courage, not self pitying often just saying he was 'not so good' when arriving on the blackest days before setting to work and through sheer will power through the course of the day shrugged off the depression'.
