Maurice Naunton Died 19th September 2011

I remember clearly the first time we met Maurice Naunton. It was at a Commons Group work party on Bickers Heath soon after he moved to Wenhaston. In conversation we learned that he was an architect and that he and his business partner had been involved in designing a village on the outskirts of Basildon and then overseeing all the building in the project.

A thought occurred that he was just the man we needed to help us pursue a project we had been thinking of for some time. Since getting together for the 'Five Commons Walk' leaflet we had the idea of producing a map of the village but did not know how to begin. Maurice was the person we needed to lead this project. When approached he gave it considerable thought before saying yes.

How pleased we were, although we did not realise how much detailed planning would be needed to get the project off the ground. Although Maurice was modest and insisted it was a team effort he did all the planning, filling up forms for grants, organising all sketching, surveying and photographing work parties, liaising with the Primary School for their contribution and arranging exhibitions in the church - all in meticulous detail. Finally he got the printing of the map completed for the grand launch in the Village Hall at the end of October 2000. The Millennium Map could not have been produced without him.

He was a joy to work with. Every stage went smoothly. His attention to detail was thorough. The grant money was spent wisely and kept within budget. Everyone knew exactly when photographs and sketches of their properties would take place. Only three householders opted out. As with all commons work parties each session ended with welcome refreshments provided by his supportive wife Barbara. Through Maurice's proven ability we have an accurate record of the village and its activities at the turn of the century.

We celebrated the tenth anniversary of the map last year and are so pleased that Maurice was able to take a major part in the display. Another way Wenhaston gained from his skills was creating a disabled toilet area in the Village Hall and also helping the village Pre-School project. We have lost a good friend and contributor to the community of Wenhaston.

Call 101 ~ A New Way To Contact Your Police

Suffolk Constabulary has introduced a new telephone number, 101, for people who want to talk to the police about non-urgent issues. It is designed to offer an easy way to report non-emergency crimes, disorder or anti-social behaviour, or to speak to your local police officers.

For example ring 101 if:

- a vehicle has been stolen
- property has been damaged
- there is suspect drug use or dealing
- you wish to give the police information about crime in the area
- you wish to speak to a local police officer.

Available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with calls from landlines and mobile networks costing 15p per call, no matter what time of day or the duration of the call.

Those who are deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired can textphone 18001 101.

This is part of a nationwide initiative which will see all forces adopting the number by the end of 2011. It is also hoped that the introduction of 101 will help divert more non-urgent calls away from the 999 system, freeing up call handlers to deal with genuine emergencies. In an emergency, always ring 999 for immediate police assistance.

Wenhaston Energy Support Group ~ See Your House In A Different Light

One third of the energy produced in our homes can be lost through walls and windows and that could mean hundreds of pounds literally thrown away.

A thermal imaging camera, which Wenhaston Energy Support Group will trial this month, will seek out those cold spots in a house. The photographs and data produced will then enable the householder to plug the gaps and save cash.

A team of Wenhaston operatives have been trained by East Bergholt Society, who loaned the camera, and they are planning to visit residents' homes between 12 and 25 November. If you would like to take part in the project email info@wenhastongreen.org or telephone Janice Claxton on 01502 478158.

Appointments will be made strictly on a 'first come first served' basis.

WESG hopes to include public buildings, such as the Village Hall, Primary School, the Star and the Methodist Chapel, in the project.

In order to cover costs the group is asking for a small donation of £2. There will also be a small charge for colour printing if you do not have access to a computer. WESG would welcome feedback from residents who make any energy-saving improvements as a result of the camera data provided.

News From Southwold Surgery

You will have seen that construction has started by putting in the roads and services to the Healthy Living Centre on what was Eversley Playing Field. We are fairly confident that at long last construction of the building will begin mid 2012. In the meantime we continue to soldier on in inadequate accommodation doing our best to improve our medical services.

You will also be aware of the outstandingly successful project we have to link primary and social care and by effective case management look after our patients closer to home. Unfortunately, we are still not funded to enable this project to be fully effective without relying on charitable donations. Nurse Practitioner Cathy Ryan as the 'Case Manager' has just completed her climb of Kilimanjaro and many congratulations to her. She raised over £5,000 for what is now called 'The Solebay Care Fund'. This has now been given charitable status and all donations will be gratefully received and will be spent on care, in all its forms, needed by our patients which cannot be provided from either NHS or Social Service funds.

New Opening Hours

A further improvement is the Surgery is to offer late opening appointments in the evening between 6:30 - 7:00pm, Monday to Friday. This is for routine appointments, by prior arrangement, to fit in those who cannot attend during normal surgery hours, which are now 8:00am - 6:30pm Monday to Friday. We hope this new service will be welcome and prove to

be a success. We are sorry that new government policy has meant we can no longer open on Saturday mornings.

Flu

With the season of coughs, colds, nasty bugs and flu now with us we would like to remind all over 65s that they are entitled to a free FLU injection. If you have not had one yet and are over 65 or in the 'At Risk' categories, and if you are, you will know, please phone the Surgery to make an appointment. Also, if you are over 65 and have not had a 'Pneumonia' vaccination you are entitled to have one. This is a once in a lifetime injection and is highly recommended as all the nasties can develop into Pneumonia if one is unlucky.

Repeat Prescriptions

If you are on repeat prescriptions you can now order them on the internet. To join up, either go to our website www.southwoldsurgery.co.uk and follows the instructions, or phone the surgery leaving your name and email address and you will be signed up. Also, your repeat prescriptions can be picked up from the Blythweb Office provided that you ask for that to be done and you either do not pay for your prescriptions, or you have made a prepayment.

Finally, let me remind you that we have an excellent 'Patient Participation Group' and if you have any suggestions which would improve our services, please let one of the group know; their names are on the board in the Surgery.

Local History – Village Green

Just to add a note to Keith Johnceline's interesting conjecture as to the original whereabouts of the village green (Local History Matters 34, October 2011 Wenhashton Word): the brick house, which is in front of Ingleside and Clay cottages, does give the appearance, from the outside, of 18th century construction; however when it was listed, in 1998, evidence of an earlier building was identified from some of the internal timbers – a building dating back to about 1620 (although it was acknowledged that the outside had been "largely rebuilt about 1780"). This would still mean that it was a later addition than the 16th century Ingleside, Clay and Oakwood cottages - but not much later. *Janet Wagon*

Being part of the Wenhaston Commons Group (WCG) work parties has taught me a lot about the commons; the village; wild-life here and what's important for the future of the village and the lovely countryside around it. We moved here from Westleton last year. I was keen to carry on the sort of voluntary work I had experience of from my time in Westleton. The two villages have much in common – including a special social history, abundant wildlife and lovely open common ground.

I was keen to join the regular work parties here and I was surprised to find the work is the same and for the same reasons as it was in Westleton: to sustain the natural environment for the community including its people and wildlife. Working together is fun. I've often stood back as several of us are scything, raking and forking piles of bracken in the open air and sunshine and thought it almost a biblical scene!

Whilst we work we also talk and learn about wildlife in the village. The WCG has set up a number of bird nesting boxes, there is a butterfly count and places where slow worms sleep. There are rare species of butterfly and newts that can be found on the commons and there are species we'd like to encourage back. Learning about these has helped me understand why the work parties are important, and that makes it all the more enjoyable and worthwhile.

The work parties are not very long and we always have a break in the middle where Heather and Peter Phillips bring us gorgeous homemade refreshments. There are regular events like the picnic in the photo. The work parties need more people of all ages. It's easy to join: just turn up! The dates and times are found here in the Word. Someone always shows you what to do, and why. Health and Safety is important and you just do what you can and want to do safely. **Ann Follows**
