

Elisabeth, as she was known, was a very versatile and accomplished lady with a wide repertoire of talents.

The Eulogy was given by Judy Boyt (daughter) who gave details of her mother's life from the time she was brought up in Dorset until the present time. She had married three times and with her last husband Graham travelled to many different places in the world. They bought Cobblers Cottage in Wenhaston and renovated and lived in it until they died. Elisabeth survived her husband by three years.

The overall aim of the scheme is to enable consumers to make informed decisions about the selection of a provider based on direct customer feedback. Local History Matters: 33

The Guildhall

The Guildhall (now Church Cottages), was built in the early 16th century, overlooking the churchyard. A deed dated 6th January 1513 concerned land lying to the west of the churchyard that had recently been built upon. The Guild in Wenhaston was not a Trade Guild, but a Church Guild. This looked after the salvation of the members and prayed for their souls when they died. Church Guilds were closed down in 1547 by order of Henry VIII.

When Pepyn and Lessey founded the school in the 1560s it is fairly certain the school started on the first floor of the Guildhall while the overseer of the poor occupied the ground floor. The school moved to what is now the Church Room in the early 19th century and the property turned into three cottages and let. The rents were used for the repair and upkeep of the church.

Looking through the Churchwardens' Accounts one is made aware of the continuing items recorded for the repair and upkeep of the Guildhall with bricks and thatch appearing many times. The roof was reroofed in the 19th century.

Advice To Keep Your Jewellery Safe

Suffolk Police are urging people to take extra measures to ensure expensive and sentimental items of jewellery are kept safe from burglars.

Keeping doors and windows locked will slow offenders down and the forcing of them may cause noise and can attract attention. However, once inside a property burglars may be able to search and locate expensive items of jewellery. Any such items should be kept in a secure location, ideally a very good quality safe.

Do not keep items in the top drawer of a chest of drawers or in the back of the wardrobe, this is generally the first place offenders will look.

Property marking is really important, and you can advertise the fact that this has been done by displaying window stickers.

SmartWater can be used to mark items - it is invisible to the naked eye but is detectable by police using specialised equipment. Each SmartWater formula is unique, and the marking can be tested to trace the owner of the item.

You can also take detailed photographs. If you have the items valued keep this information safe and separate from the jewellery. If the jewellery is stolen we can circulate the pictures to auction rooms, jewellers and dealers and so stand a better chance of its recovery.

Alarms, security lighting and CCTV can all be used to keep homes more secure. Keep gardens tidy and gates locked so criminals have nowhere to hide. If you notice any suspicious people or vehicles at your neighbour's property, call police. Dial 999 if a crime is in progress.

John Castle was the workhouse boy that Douglas Baker came to talk to us about. What an amazing man John was, raising from a pauper family to founding the Co-operative Society in Colchester. John was $2\frac{1}{2}$ when his father, a chimney sweep, moved to Sudbury in Buckinghamshire. Shortly afterwards his father died leaving the family destitute. John's grandmother walked the 75 miles from Coggleshall to attend the funeral and to take the 2 year old boy back with her. At the age of 8 he went to a writing school for a year. Mr. Baker passed a photocopy of an example of John's writing, its legibility was something today's youngsters could aspire to. On reaching 9 years John went to work in a silk mill, his first job was to clean the silk, working his way up to become a weaver. Here Mr. Baker deviated slightly to give us some information on the silk trade.

We listened while he read a poignant little tale from John's diary. How he, unwillingly, went rooking. This was at a time when the practice was classed as poaching and the punishment, if caught, severe. The lads evaded the game keeper and climbed the 50 feet trees to the nests. One of the boys fell from the tree, broke his neck and was paralysed for the rest of his life. He subsequently learnt to draw and paint, Queen Victoria bought one of his sketches for five guineas. To hear more of John's adult life we will have to ask Mr Baker to come and talk to us again.

Our Wenhaston Show Day was well advertised in the SEFWI news. We were asked to put our thinking caps on to come up with exciting ways to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee next year.

An electric car plugging into free energy at the village hall, a thermal imaging camera to monitor heat loss, buying land for a community wood, a half-hourly bus service and a group initiative to tender for photovoltaic panels....

These were just some of the exciting ideas that emerged from a brain-storming session following Wenhaston Energy Support Group's AGM.

Dr Zoe Wallage, from the Low Carbon Innovation Centre at the University of East Anglia, gave a brief summary of a report commissioned by WESG, outlining the possible options for Wenhaston in its efforts to reduce carbon emissions and, at the same time, save cash. She emphasised the importance of achieving demand reduction and energy efficiency before moving on to renewable schemes.

Janet Dillaway, chair, said that the way forward is for like-minded village groups to join together and forge links for the future.

Some of the challenging suggestions from residents will now be incorporated into an Action Plan which WESG will work on over the coming months.
