We've done it again – the 601 bus is back! By popular request the Anglian Bus 601 Lowestoft service returns on Thursdays starting June 7. The bus picks up in The Street at 9:26 and arrives at Lowestoft at 10:10. The return journey leaves Lowestoft at 14:00 arriving back at Wenhaston 40 minutes later.

The return of this vital link is thanks to a very positive public response, to those who spent time and trouble collecting that response and to Anglian for taking up the challenge. At present the bus will run only on Thursdays, but if demand is maintained, the service will hopefully be expanded.

And don't forget – if you think you are eligible for a 'Suffolk Saver' pass do ask for a form at the Post Office and apply now - all you need is a passport photo. Journeys which start and finish in Suffolk are then free.

Our Course this Spring was " The Play's the Thing" - theatre and play-acting in the work of William Shakespeare.

The number of people attending varied from 16 to 20 and the format adopted by our Tutor, Barbara Langley, was that of informal Seminar or Discussion Group.

As usual, Barbara had planned the Course very carefully with a focus theme for each week or group of weeks. After a short introduction to the history of theatre and its significance in Elizabethan Society we discussed; *Self-conscious Theatricality, Plays within Plays, Role Play (characters who pretend to be someone or something else), Tricks and Deceptions and Feigning Madness.*

Each theme was illustrated by extracts from the plays; those of us who liked to read a part had a chance to do so. Video clips helped Barbara reinforce the points made. Reading and Video-watching were both much enjoyed by the group. I know they were because, without prompting, many participants told me so.

It was all very entertaining. Did we learn anything? I did. I can't speak for the others but I would be amazed if they could remain untouched by the witty, humane, subtle power of Shakespeare's mastery of the Actor/Playwright's trade. All that, and the language, too!

Two final, personal comments. Barbara's approach would, I think, be even more successful with a smaller group - say 10 to 12 people. I suppose economics would get in the way, though. Second, where were the men? There were only two of us. We both enjoyed it and I'm sure other men would if they gave it a go. This was, undoubtedly, a very popular course.

Stuart Hayward-Rutter

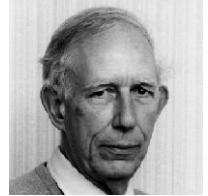
I am married with two children, both at local schools. After serving in the RAF and Police, I now work at a local school. I am on the Gardening Club Committee, and help with

Local History Matters: 1

If one travels south on to the A12 from Blythburgh, just before you reach the turning to Bramfield and Halesworth, you pass on the right the entrance to Thorington Quarry. Some years ago some Dinosaur bones were found. Therefore some 65 million years ago these animals were roaming around Wenhaston! During the last major Ice Age (400,000 years ago) the thickness of the ice over East Anglia was between half a mile and a mile thick. No wonder East Anglia is flat. However, the first signs of human habitation comes in the Bronze Age, about 2000 BC. Due to Dr St Joseph and his team from Cambridge University in the 1950s we have hundreds of aerial photos of East Anglia. From these many new archaeological sites were discovered. One of these was of a Bronze Age Barrow on the top of Star Hill. Although the ground is now flat due to hundreds of years ploughing, during the mid summer one can still see the crop marks from the air.
