Jean Wilson



Jean Wilson, widow of Walter who died a year ago, passed away peacefully in Foxearth Nursing Home at Saxtead on 22nd September aged 71 She came to

the area in the early 1950s to work as a junior nurse at the Patrick Stead Hospital when it had 14 maternity beds and 16 or so beds on the general wards. She met Walter there when he was visiting his terminally ill mother and they were married in 1956 when Jean was just 17.

Like several other young couples they started married life in Church Terrace living at number 4 and it was here that their two boys were born. In 1964 they moved to the new bungalow, Stonecott, in St Michael's Way, that Walter had built himself.

When the boys started school Jean worked part-time as a nursing auxiliary at Blythburgh and District Hospital and later transferred to the sewing room there as a seamstress. She worked until 1981 when the arthritis she was suffering from became worse. A series of operations to the joints in nearly all parts of her body followed and she became more immobile, but for a time she was able to continue with her hobbies of embroidery and painting in watercolours. In spite of the great difficulty she had using her hands that the disease had deformed she produced some exquisite samples of her talents. For a time she was able to enjoy feeling her way around a computer and produced Christmas cards for a couple of years, but it was not long before it became impossible for her to use this.

Last year she had the lower half of one leg amputated and had to go into full-time nursing care 18 months ago as Walter was no longer able to continue with the devoted care, love and attention she had from him over the years.

Many of her friends will remember her cheerfulness in adversity as she seldom complained. Private cremation took place in Norwich on October 2nd and her ashes will be interred in her husband's grave in Wenhaston cemetery later. **Derek Newby**

Speeding Traffic

Speeding traffic is a big concern for many communities across Suffolk and often local motorists are the worst offenders.

To help tackle speeding problems, many communities have brought in SID – the Speed Indicator Display that reminds motorists of their speed with a smile or sad face. As well as providing useful data about traffic speeds and acting as a speeding deterrent, it is estimated that using SID reduces traffic speeds by an average of 14%.

Police Safer Neighbourhood Teams are working with their communities to buy a police-approved hand-held speed gun and train local volunteers to record speeding cars. The police can then identify the owner of the vehicle and either send a first or second warning letter or make a personal visit on the third detected offence.

You can play your part to improve road safety by reporting speeding motorists, as well as defects such as potholes, blocked drains, missing or obscured road signs.

"Star of Wenhaston"

Over 200 people joined the family for the funeral Service at St. Peter's on October 3 for Maurice George Stammers who died peacefully at the age of 81 in the Patrick Stead Hospital on September 24 after a long battle with illness.

At Maurice's request the Service was lead by The Rev'd Anna Wright. Grand-daughter Melanie read a poem she had written entitled "Our Grandad". The Reading of 1 Corinthians chapter 13 was by Ina Gray. The hymns The Day Thou Gavest, The Old Rugged Cross and Lord of all Hopefulness were sung. The cortege approached the Church to the strains of "Autumn Leaves" by Paolo Nutini chosen by Craig and the drawing of a lawnmower was by Rachael and appropriately displayed on the front of the order of Service sheets.

Son Trevor gave a resume of his life saying that he was born at Sibton one of eleven children, 6 boys and 5 girls. He left school when he was 14 and started work as dairyman and milkman at Thorington and Darsham. When old enough to drive he worked for Keens of Saxmundham, lorry driving and concreting runways. He did National Service with the Royal Engineers and by chance met up with his brother Jack in Jerusalem when they were both serving in Palestine.

After the war he and Jack were driving lorries for T & J Kidner when the firm was seeking volunteers to do milk collections between Stranraer, Scotland and Larne, Northern Ireland. They were both lodging in Larne and it was here that he met Mary and they were married in 1953. They moved to their bungalow in Wenhaston during their first year and lived there ever since.

He and Jack worked for Unispeed (SPD) from 1970 until 1985 and then Maurice at Hammonds until retirement. Daughter Jeni recounted some amusing aspects of his life including domestic disasters and how he avoided having to do the things he didn't want to. Instead he found easier ways for Mary to do them. He loved his chocolate and ice-cream.

In her address the Rev'd. Anna emphasized his qualities of physical hardness and strength of character needed to fulfil an astonishing amount of devotion to two vital parts of Wenhaston - the parish council and the village hall. He had held the demanding reins of the village hall management for 34 years and it was only a year ago that he gave up.

One of his most outstanding traits was his forthrightness. He welcomed the so-called incomers and she said that only yesterday one of these who had lived here for merely 20 years had said Maurice was one of the first people to befriend him and the most wonderful and helpful person he had ever met in Suffolk. He was truly a "star of Wenhaston".

Maurice was carried from his home and out of the Church by his sons and grandsons and left the Church to the music of O Sole Mio (Just one Cornetto).

He was buried in Wenhaston cemetery and all were invited to join the family afterwards for light refreshments in the Village Hall. Derek Newby

Mothers' Union Report for November 2008

Pat Kemsley was in the Chair for our October meeting, and led us in prayer after we lustily sang 'For the Beauty of the Earth'. We heard that the Archdeaconry event at Sibton in September had been very inspirational, and that as a result, the branch wished to support the Mothers' Union Literacy Project, whereby the money spent is used to train African women in literacy skills which they in turn pass on to other women, and even some men have now shown an interest in it. It was decided to hold a raffle for a basket of groceries at our December meeting, and the proceeds would be sent to help fund literacy training. Members are invited to bring along items for the basket at the November meeting, please.

Our speaker for the afternoon was Mr Martin Humphries, from TWAM (Tools with a Mission). The charity collects all sorts of tools - electrical, plumbing, car, sewing machines for instance, and sorts them at their warehouses, one of which is situated in Ipswich. They make up tool kits which are packed in Ipswich and transported to Uganda, Zambia, Kenya and Rwanda where they are greatly appreciated and much used. They also work with other agencies, and therefore the tools end up all over the world. There are 200 collectors for TWAM countrywide, and last year 20 containers with 211 tons of goods were transported through Felixstowe (this would probably have ended up as land fill otherwise!). British Airways are very helpful in carrying some of the tools and offering free air freight.

The aims of the charity are threefold to recycle as much as possible to benefit of the TWAM workers here to benefit of the recipients

It was agreed that this is another very worthwhile cause, and if anyone wishes to donate items, I have details of whom to contact.

Local History Matters: 15

Public Houses

There were beer houses in most villages. Here one could have been at Sycamore Cottage. Under the carpet there is a trap door to a large cellar! In 1861 there was an Inn called David and Harp. No longer there, but is now Beech House at the top of Blyford Lane.

The Compasses had a mention in 1619. In 1745 it was called 'The Anchor' and owned by John Wakeman, who leased it to James Canham, a carpenter, and he changed the name to 'Carpenters Arms'. In 1839 it was still known by that name, but by 1844 it was 'The Compasses', perhaps due to the pub sign.

During the building of the House of Industry at Bulcamp, the Governors held their committee meetings at The Compasses. Good thinking! In 2001 it was no longer a pub but a restaurant and bed and breakfast and in July 2003 it was called Green Blade and became a Christian Retreat.

The Star was built probably late 18th century and is now the only pub in the village. In 1644 Thomas Ambler, the priest of Wenhaston and William Raymond, priest of Blyford were accused among other charges, of frequenting the alehouse of Edmund Browne of Halesworth. This was the White Hart. Both priests were ejected from their churches.

The Queens Head at Blyford was shown on a map dated 1610. Known as 'Smugglers' Inn, it had its usual ghost story to keep enquiring minds at bay. In July 1988 the thatched roof was destroyed by fire, but quickly repaired.

Nature Notes

Horse Chestnut leaf mining Moth - Cameraria ohridella. From information obtained from the Royal Horticultural Society.

This Moth sometimes referred to as the 'Greek Moth' was first recorded in Wimbledon in 2002 and is now spreading throughout the Country. The tiny moth lays its eggs on the foliage where the caterpillars create broad elongate whitish-brown mines between the leaf veins. The leaves eventually turning brown and falling. The leaf miner over winters as pupae inside the mined leaves.

No chemical treatments are available for this leaf miner. Burning fallen horse chestnut leaves will destroy over wintering pupae, but this is only of value on isolated trees where most of the leaves can be gathered up. Garden compost heaps rarely get hot enough and this insect will not be killed by a cold winter. Not all horse chestnuts are susceptible to this pest. The common horse chestnut, Aesculus hippocastanum is very susceptible while Aesculus turbinata and some Aesculus carnea are moderately susceptible. Some Aesculus species appear to be resistant and of these Aesculus indica is closest in appearance to the common horse chestnut if a replacement tree is required. Jenny Jeffrey 01502 478815


