An exciting and challenging photo-voltaic initiative will be launched by Wenhaston Energy Support Group at a meeting in the Church Room on 8 September following its successful solar hot water project.

(See advert on front page).

So, what is PV? The answer to that and many other related issues will be given both by impartial advisers, installers and those who have already bought into the schemes.

PV panels, usually roof-mounted, generate solar electricity. The Feed-In Tariff, set up in April 2010, guarantees a minimum payment for all electricity generated, as well as a separate payment for any electricity exported to the National Grid. These payments, which are tax free, are in addition to any savings on utility bills made by properties using the power generated on site.

If there is any interest in the 'rent-a-roof' scheme WESG can give people more information.

Three companies, EastGreen, Mosscliff and Solar Works, have been invited to this information forum and WESG anticipates they will give quotations for a community group purchase scheme during the evening, with any discounts depending on the number of residents who wish to sign up.

There are many companies in the PV market place and WESG chose these three because they are Suffolk-based and certified under the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (MCS).

Postcard To Wenhaston

Wenhaston is where I spent my early years, damming the marsh rivers, fishing nothing much out of the Blyth, making spears out of the bracken, and playing football on the pitch until it was so dark we couldn't see each other, with a heavy leather ball soaked in dubbin, with a bladder held in place by a lace you really didn't want to header. Even getting the ball off the ground was a challenge, and if managed, those on the receiving end were wise enough to let it bounce to avoid the initial impact. It was in those unenlightened days when we all collected bird's eggs and catapulted most things that hopped and flew, or just broke in a primitively satisfying manner - we could understand where William Golding was coming from with Lord of the Flies.

Then I began to ease away from Wenhaston but always returning, first often and then occasionally, to see my Mum and Dad, and because Wenhaston is a lovely place.

Whilst living in Middleton with my wife Cathy and two young children we grew restless and wondered what else was out there. Within two years we found ourselves standing in Christchurch airport on the South Island of New Zealand, with several bags, two bewildered children, a crushing homesickness and no real plan.

We stayed four years - it is a fantastic place - and came back for a holiday. I then left it ten years before returning to the UK again, ten years spent exploring this wonderful country. But home is where the heart is, and coming back made me realise that Wenhaston will always be my home.

New Zealand's landscape can be vast, raw, intimidating and challenging, a place where people go for a brief stroll and are never seen again, whereas Suffolk is tamed, cosy and inviting. Upon my return I had a great time jogging around the network of lanes and footpaths that make it all so accessible, reacquainting myself with the myriad of wild flowers and extraordinary variety of mostly native animals (New Zealand has only three native mammals). I made full use of the free historic buildings - a church in every village, and was pleasantly reminded of the essential importance of that neutral ground where all can meet and chat - the British pub. Wenhaston is fortunate to be away from any main route - you have to make an effort to get there so most of the appeal has been preserved and long may it stay that way.

However, here are a few messages. Those who love the village will understand. Farmers, great job letting the remaining hedges fill out cleaning up the industry, it may be your land but everyone notices when you take away a pond or hedgerow for just a few more kilos of crop - it is worth more than that left alone. Dog owners, the commons are not just for your animals to poo on - clear it up or at least kick it off the path. New comers, you moved there because it is a wonderful village as it stands, if you don't like it don't change it, just leave. Conservationists, please ask the long term locals what they'd like to happen and compromise, you are only trying to create an idealised landscape and not a natural one. Developers, leave it alone, and if you were responsible for that balancing barn hang your head in shame. To those who appreciate Wenhaston as it is, you have a lot to lose so get building those barricades.

Lastly, thanks for having me, I'm not going to leave it as long before returning again I hope, but then there is a whole world to explore between New Zealand and Wenhaston so that promise may not hold.

Wenhaston Birds (No.3) – Well, what do I know?

Firstly, I must confess that the opening title of my article is a bit of a misnomer. In reality it should be 'North Wenhaston Birds'! If I may explain. In bird watching parlance, I am very much a 'local patch' watcher. The patch I have adopted since moving to the village two years ago this month broadly covers that area between Blyford Lane to the west, Blythburgh Church to the East and all that parcel of very mixed habitat between the B1123 to the north and Hall Road and Wenhaston Lane to the South. Technically, much of this land falls within the parishes of Henham and Wangford, Blyford and Blythburgh. Whilst I do look for and watch birds in the rest (and greater part) of our parish I do not do so in such an intense and regular manner. However, I do know these areas to be watched by at least one birder, Peter Dare, who is far more knowledgeable than me and with whom I exchange information on a regular basis. Despite some 85 years of birding experience between us, during which time we have both become accomplished identifiers of

bird song (probably the easiest way to detect the presence of a particular species), we can still miss birds that are right under our nose.

He and I have often discussed the number of species that seem to have either been lost to, or are in steep decline from the natural habitats around the village. Birds such as Nightingale, Yellow Wagtail, Turtle Dove, Treecreeper and the Spotted Flycatcher. The latter raises a point in case. Neither of us had ever found a 'SpotFly' in the village until one turned up in my garden on 26th July this year. It only stayed a short while but long enough for me to take a distant, grainy photo. A few days later I was asked by a local resident if I had seen anything exciting lately and explained my recent find. 'Oh my neighbour had a pair of those in his garden and fledged four young'.

Knowing exactly where he meant, I couldn't believe I had not known of this discovery already. Worse still, and to further deflate my twitching prowess, two days later I was asked by a neighbour some three doors away to identify 'a pretty little bird like a Robin but without a red breast'. I hot footed it as requested and, sure enough, there was not one but two adult Spotted Flycatchers, insects in beak, queuing up on a prominent fence post (see photo) with food for a nearby nest containing young. Now given that both these nests were within 30 yards of Church Common where I walk almost daily, how did I miss them – by sound if not by sight? What do I know indeed!

Fish Thief
